2015 is the Centenary Year of the WI in England and Wales. 'Barbara moved to Brookwood with her husband Fred when Heath Drive was first built. They had two children, Sally and Philip (Pip). She was devoted to her family which eventually grew to include grandchildren and great grandchildren. For many years Barbara worked at Brookwood School serving lunches to the children. As a neighbour and friend Barbara was one of the best, and one year won the best neighbour award. She was always cheerful and rarely complained. Barbara was both a valued long-standing member of Brookwood WI, serving on the committee and organising many enjoyable outings, and a producer for Pirbright WI market selling her renowned sponge and fruit

cakes. Barbara also helped the local visually impaired group, as a sighted helper, at their craft meetings and on their holidays.

Fred died many years ago and sadly Sally died last year. Barbara spent her last two years in the Kingsclear Nursing home in Camberley.'

# BROOKWOOD FAIR

We were delighted to welcome one and all to the Brookwood Fair, held at Brookwood School on Saturday 13 June. This year it really felt like the whole community came together on this warm (if not particularly sunny) afternoon. Held at the end of the school's Art Week, the fair started with an Art Attack where the children recreated the school logo out of items scavenged from around school – including our famous Hi-Viz jackets and the teachers' coats! They also sang a rousing rendition of a favourite song 'We're So Proud of Our School'. The art theme continued with an exhibition of children's work, the Brookwood Art Group display and sale, and an opportunity for people to have their portrait drawn. Councillor Kevin Davis is arranging for some of the children's work to be on display for a few weeks in the telephone box Art Gallery near the station.



We welcomed The Winston Churchill School Session Band for the first time this year – a brilliant group of talented students who entertained us twice during the afternoon – and very much hope they will come again in the future. As is tradition, Messy Church attended, bringing their 20:20 Puppets for a show, the WI (who won the Best Dressed Stall Award this year) celebrated their centenary with us, St

Saviour's Pre-School had a stall, and the Scouts supplemented their ever-popular crockery smash with a candy floss stall. Two 'Army Dads' designed and ran an assault course which was very popular with the children.



The Brookwood Club were ever-generous in manning the beer tent all afternoon and raising £375 for us; it looks like the local beer on offer went down very well! Brookwood Sainsbury's allowed the school space to sell raffle tickets and ticket sales were further boosted with help from the St Saviour's congregation. Fulks' finest meats were served from the barbecue and many other local businesses supported the Fair by donating raffle prizes. Friends of Brookwood School (FOBS) ran the event smoothly and efficiently.

# SPEEDING CONCERNS

## A letter from a Connaught Road resident

'In the last 6 years of living on the road the number of vehicles speeding has increased significantly, and this has become a dangerous road for all who live here. What concerns me most is that people speeding along the road have no due care or attention to the fact there is a school on this road and some use as it their own personal race track.

One of the main problems I believe is that Connaught Road has become more of a through-road for people travelling to work towards Frimley, Bagshot and beyond, and they have no connection or care when driving through Brookwood. I regularly see cars speeding through here at above 40mph with the bumps not deterring many people. The motorbikes on a weekend and cars with interesting exhaust sounds are of particular concern speeding through.

I contacted the council 2 years ago and asked about speed restriction signage, and I was told there wasn't any budget available. I contacted the police who sent a speed camera and sat for 2 hours at 11am on a week day and then said there is no problem. But there is, and it is only a matter of time before someone is seriously hurt or killed.

We need to ensure that all motorists, not just those passing through, respect the 30mph limit through the village as they may have missed the one sign we have telling them that. Maybe we could start a petition to put to the council or police?'

We have passed the letter on to Kevin Davis who will be writing an article in the August edition of the Newsletter with an update on action he has been investigating to address speeding and traffic concerns in Brookwood.

# DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

## Important news from Kevin Davis, our local Councillor

Woking Borough Council has published its suggestions for the delivery of future housing across the borough. This has been a lengthy process spanning over two years. There now follows a six-week consultation process which began on 18 June 2015. The proposals affect Brookwood and it is imperative that as many people as possible respond. The next 25 years of development will be influenced by the next few months.

In Brookwood, proposals suggest that Coblands and Five Acres will be taken out of the Green Belt, which I support. Coblands is earmarked for 37 homes and Five Acres subject to an expansion of over 50%. I have concerns over how the officers have reached their conclusions and will be responding to the consultation.
