BROOKWOOD BULLDOGS

A few weeks ago, someone put a news cutting through my door about a cycle craze that happened in the 1950s, involving a team from Brookwood, called the Brookwood Bulldogs. I contacted the journalist, David Rose, to see if he had any further information on the local team. He has kindly sent the item below.

Cycle speedway was a craze that swept the nation in the immediate post-Second World War years and saw teenagers race pushbikes around cinder tracks. Towns and villages throughout the UK spawned hundreds of teams, and in the Woking area there were the Old Woking Jets, Chobham Rockets, Send Mustangs and Brookwood Bulldogs. They competed against one other in fierce contests on bikes assembled from old and spare parts, and without brakes or mudguards. Crowds would turn out to see the races that took place on waste ground near to where the youngsters lived. The Brookwood Bulldogs' track was at Sheets Heath. At the track, the brakes would be removed and the riders donned their crash helmets and bright tabards, which usually included the name of their team. It was not uncommon for coaches to be hired for their family and fans to travel to the competitions.

A former Brookwood Bulldogs rider, Arthur Martin, who was 14 years old when he first

raced, recalled: 'Chobham Rockets and Old Woking Jets started the whole thing off. We heard about them at school and used to go to see them at Coxhill, Chobham. We then started going to Brookwood and managed to get into the Bulldog team. There was always a big crowd no matter where we went. The crowd would sit up on the sandbanks - there was a bigger following for cycle speedway than either cricket or football. We had such pride in our bikes - we made them ourselves. We lived in Knaphill and would ride along the canal towpath to get to Brookwood. Then in the evening we would have to ride back in the dark trying to avoid the canal.'

The cycle speedway craze was not to last. As the young riders grew up they were called up for National Service, and when many of them reached the age of 18, they were tempted to ride motorcycles instead. However, cycle speedway remained fairly popular into the 1960s, and it even continues to this day in a few parts of the UK, although not in Surrey.



BROOKWOOD AND BRIDLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

The Brookwood and Bridley Neighbourhood Forum has received grant funding for the next phase of the Neighbourhood Plan project. Although the amount was less than requested, it has allowed the committee to appoint professional planning consultants to work on the evidence gathered so far, and bring together all aspects in one document for assessment against national policy, guidance and legislation. This 'Gap Analysis' then leads into a review of the community profile from the 2011 census data, the national and district planning policy including housing, employment, infrastructure, historical and natural environment issues. The Forum is still looking for additional volunteers for about 4 to 6 hours per month, including some internet-based research, so if you can spare the time please contact us (chair@bbnf.org.uk).
