## • BROOKWOOD MEMORIAL HALLS

• **Defibrillator** – Brookwood Memorial Hall has a defibrillator by the steps between the two halls, accessible whenever the hall is in use. It gives simple verbal instructions on use. For further guidance, just Google 'defibrillator video'. Hall gate keys are held by regular hirers and a contact phone number is on the gate.

• **Book of Remembrance** – Brookwood Memorial Halls were erected as a lasting community resource, funded from villager donations to commemorate those who gave their lives in the two World Wars for our freedom. The stories of 17 of the 18 people named on the plaque in the Memorial Hall were presented recently at St Saviour's Church, and previously at moving presentations by Scouts at the Remembrance Services at the Hall. We want to collate the stories into a Book of Remembrance with a display cabinet, but one name needs more research – T. Price Please contact [management@bmhalls.org.uk](mailto:management@bmhalls.org.uk) if you have any information. One villager has anonymously provided a substantial donation to help with the project, which we gratefully acknowledge. Any other donations would be most welcome.

• **Hall hire** – The Halls are well-used and are a popular venue for children's parties. They are kept to a high standard, meeting all Charity Commission and safety requirements. They are available at discounted rates to villagers and charities; email [lettings@bmhalls.org.uk](mailto:lettings@bmhalls.org.uk) or call 07757 969231. All hire proceeds go to upkeep and improvements. Recent improvements include new kerbing along

the driveway and improved external lighting. The Community Hall now has new insulated aluminium doors, thanks in part to grant funds from our County Councillor Ayesha Azad. Further planned improvements include a new cycle rack, wifi and a modern music system. We are licensed to provide all music and dance presentations.

# 'A WONDERFUL LOCAL AMENITY'



We all know and enjoy the Basingstoke Canal, but not everyone knows that the canal is currently jointly owned by Surrey County Council and Hampshire County Council. The canal has had a chequered history since its original completion in 1794, and, after several changes in fortune and ownership, it found itself in the mid-1960s in a derelict and un-navigable condition. All the locks and bridges were in need of repair, and the then private owner of the canal was drawing up plans to fill in parts and sell the land for redevelopment. It was at this point that a resident of Brookwood, Jim Woolgar, whose house backed on to the canal, sent the following letter to several local newspapers:

*Sir,  
Having spent a few days of my holiday walking the length of the Basingstoke Canal, I am wondering if the local people appreciate what an amenity they have on their doorsteps. It would appear that many are apathetic and treat it as a convenient rubbish dump; however I know that several people are interested in its possible restoration – although at the moment, due to vandalism and the Canal Company's lack of finance, it is still deteriorating. I feel the time is ripe to form a Basingstoke Canal Restoration Society so that a start could be made removing debris and clearing the towpath. Perhaps it might even be possible to re-open it for navigation.*

In 1966 the Basingstoke Canal Society (BCS) charity was formed by individuals who had the foresight to see that the canal could be renovated and brought back to life for the pleasure of all. Through constant lobbying they persuaded the two county councils to acquire the canal by the mid-1970s. Then began years of dedicated hard work by hundreds of volunteers from the BCS and others, until in 1991 the canal was fully renovated and officially re-opened by HRH The Duke of Kent.

The two counties are responsible for all maintenance and functioning of the canal and associated infrastructure, but they have created a special joint body called the Basingstoke Canal Authority (BCA) to carry out the day-to-day management and operation of the canal. The BCA is financed by contributions from the two county councils as well as to a lesser extent from the six riparian local authorities through which the canal runs. The canal's fortunes are therefore very much dependent on the funds available to be spent by these bodies. In today's climate of cuts in central government funding to local government, there is real pressure on the resources that can be allocated to the canal.

Meanwhile the BCS continues to play an active part in supporting and maintaining the canal. Volunteers spend thousands of hours every year supporting the BCA in its activities to maintain and develop the canal, and the BCS also uses its charitable resources on projects to develop and enhance the canal on behalf of the two county councils. In November 2018 the BCS had its long-time dedication recognised by the award of the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service (effectively an MBE for Voluntary Services) presented on a return visit after 27 years by HRH The Duke of Kent.

## CRÊPE SUPPER & VISIT TO CAGNY




