## THANK YOU, JEAN



Brookwood Village Halls' AGM concluded with a thank you to Jean Gable for 50 years of service to the community. The newsletter is glad to echo that and to tell a little of Jean's story.

Jean and Harry Gable came to Brookwood in 1965, moving into their house in Connaught Crescent where they still live. They brought with them baby Emma and Sarah aged 4. Jean remembers that Emma was about 2.5 years old when she was asked to help at the playgroup at the Village Hall. It ran 3 mornings a week with barely any equipment and unreliable heating. Jean got stuck in. When the next Hall AGM came round Jean was ready to take on the Management Committee in order to improve the heating. As a result of her persistence, she found herself nominated as secretary – a voluntary role that she has carried out faithfully for the last 50 years.

She remembers the Halls being in a poor state 50 years ago, but things began to improve when Mac Fryatt became Chairman and they were used much more. Jean pays tribute to the WI in Brookwood which she joined in the 1970s. The WI have supplied curtains, china, cutlery and a cooker from their fund-raising efforts – all of which make life much more comfortable for hall-users. In the early days the WI held shows on a stage in the Small Hall and pantomimes in the Large Hall, and Jean began accompanying them on the piano. Eventually she took responsibility for the drama group and became involved at County level. This led to



her joining the Pirbright Players, featuring recently in their production of 'Dinner Ladies'.

Jean is delighted that the Halls are now such a valuable community resource. 'Because they are well-used, we are able to reinvest in them' she explains, citing the new wi-fi system as an example. For Jean and her family the village halls have a special place in their hearts because of numerous sports and other activities they attended there as well as family celebrations including most recently Jean and Harry's 60th Wedding Anniversary party.

She is thrilled that the Hall Committee acknowledged her service with a party. She is handing on the paperwork to Louise Norris, another young mum, and is looking forward to a few more 'nights in' with Harry.

This seems a good opportunity to say thank you to all the Village Hall team, led by John Thornton, who give up much of their time to make the Halls available to us all.



# BROOKWOOD MEMORIAL HALLS



The two Memorial Halls, which lie just behind the Fish and Chip shop, host a wide variety of activities. Regular hirers include Social dance and Zumba classes throughout the week. In addition the regular programme currently looks like this:

- Art Groups on Mondays and Fridays
- Toddlers on Monday mornings
- Brownies on Monday evenings
- Belly Dancing on Monday evenings
- Messy Play on Tuesday mornings
- Badminton on Tuesdays and Wednesdays
- Dog scent training on Wednesday mornings
- Tai Chi on Wednesday afternoons
- Dog training on Wednesday evenings
- Pilates class on Thursday evenings
- Yoga also on Thursday evenings
- Cubs and Scouts on Friday evenings
- Rainbows on Saturdays

The Women's Institute holds its meetings in the Halls, and there are regular Bingo and Scrabble and Whist sessions.

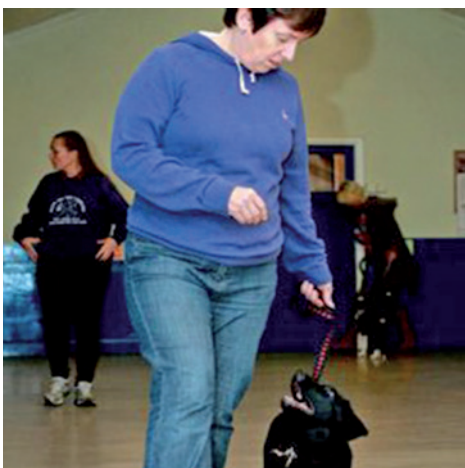
Other meetings and activities held periodically include a History Group, Allotment Society, Microscopic Club, Church Lunch, Village Lunch, StopGap Dance Company workshops, Caravan Club, Ukelele Group and Brookwood Last Post Association. The Halls are also a venue for local, national and European Elections. See [www.bmhalls.org.uk/hirers.htm](http://www.bmhalls.org.uk/hirers.htm) for more information.

The Halls are available for social functions at reasonable rates, with discounts for residents and charities. They are kept in good decorative order and are compliant with all safety regulations; they are fully licensed by Woking Council for entertainment events and PRS/PPL

for live and recorded productions and music, and are regulated by the Charity Commission. Contact Colin for letting enquiries on 07757 969231.

The Memorial Hall seats up to 120 at tables, 240 in rows, and is well equipped with tables, chairs, crockery, cutlery, décor lighting, cooking equipment, servery, lit stage, wi-fi and Bluetooth speakers, a Committee/change room and facilities for disabled people. The Small Hall hosts community and exercise events, and is ideal for children's parties, also with wi-fi and Bluetooth speakers.

The Halls were built on land donated by the London Necropolis Company, which owned the Brookwood Cemetery and surrounding land reaching to the outskirts of Woking. The Memorial Halls were funded by Brookwood residents as a lasting remembrance to local people who gave their lives in the two World Wars for our freedoms. The Halls are run by unpaid local volunteers for the benefit of all local residents without discrimination.
