WELCOME TO BROOKWOOD!



BROOKWOOD STATION



During the June downpour many commuters and rail users had to wade through the flooded underpass connecting platform 1 and platform 2. For the amount of money that is required to travel on the trains and at peak times in particular, it is not really acceptable to put up that the situation was remedied fairly quickly

following tweets to South Western Railways. On top of this, commuters and rail users have had to put up with a week of inconvenience with more overcrowding than usual through the RMT rail strikes. Whilst there is much at stake, it really is high time that differences were sorted out between South Western Railways and the RMT to enable people to get on with their lives and livelihoods. Many people have no choice but to use the train and no one wants the havoc around here that has happened to Southern Rail users, which has led to people having to move house, change lives and occupations to earn a living.

Proposed Heathrow Rail Link

Just before the most recent local election all WBC Councillors were invited to a session regarding a proposed rail link from Woking to Heathrow. I was one of the handful that attended and was enthusiastic about what I saw.

I think this would really benefit Woking economically and the residents by having a rail route that doesn't require a bus or bouncing out of London.

The consultation into Heathrow expansion will kick off soon, and my personal view is that, if Heathrow is to be expanded, then as a side project improving our access to Heathrow is essential.

Brookwood Lye Road Site

I've had quite a few people speak to me about the state of the Brookwood Lye Road site and Traveller site. I try to work on this in the background rather than publicly for the primary reason of neighbourly relations. However, I will outline what I've done recently. Firstly, begin by reading my blog entry from March as that gives a good overall background, although I believe the timescales have slipped to a degree because I'm not aware that the planning application is in yet.

With regards to the rubbish, it is being fly-tipped and that is almost certainly by the immediate neighbours, although it's debatable whether it is by illegal or legal Travellers. However, right now, I'd prefer it there than elsewhere in the borough. The plan by Thameswey is not to

clear it regularly, but wait until the site receives planning permission, and then clear it in one go and re-secure the site.

With regards to the Travellers themselves, two thirds are living there legally as per the emerging Site Allocations that has been submitted to an inspector ready for a public enguiry. The rest are totally illegal and I have been regularly trying to get the Local Planning Authority (LPA) to do something about it. Something they refuse to do for reasons unknown to me.

What I did do recently is email and speak to the Deputy Chief Executive as planning falls under his remit. I pointed out that there have been illegal Travellers there now for three odd years and nothing has happened. I also pointed out that moving them on will be incredibly difficult and timescales will be measured in years rather than days. That will obviously hold the development up at some point and increase costs.

The LPA are doing what they always do, which is to write another report and fob us off for a few more months. With the political changes recently, it will become apparent over the next few days how best to proceed and escalate this.

BROOKWOOD IN BLOOM



You may have noticed the growing numbers of colourful pots and containers (including a wheelbarrow, a fire grate and a bicycle) appearing along Connaught Road. Over 30 have now been put out, many of them filled with annuals kindly donated by Wickes. Thank you to all the residents who have supplied the pots and volunteered to keep them watered over the summer. Take a closer look and you'll see some inspirational quotes in the pots to help encourage us all to get our hands dirty in our own gardens. Pupils at Brookwood School have also designed a "Brookwood in Bloom" poster, which you will see around the village.

Earlier in June, the Brookwood Cubs and a group of local volunteers came together to help plant over 300 plants in the beds on the corners of Connaught Crescent and Heath Drive. They are now filled with new shrubs, grasses and perennials that should provide colour and scent for years to come! Thanks to everyone who helped and to the nearby residents who are kindly donating their hoses to keep the beds

Many residents have already been inspired to tidy up their own gardens or plant new pots. If you haven't yet, there's still time! On Tuesday 9 July an Royal Horticultural Society judge will come and view our efforts along the main road – so please do get involved.

Our next litter pick (and the last one before the RHS visit) is on Sunday 7 July at 2pm. We will meet outside Brookwood School. It's great fun (honestly!) and another opportunity to meet neighbours you may not know and do something for the village.
