RAILWAY 200 CELEBRATIONS

If you have recently walked through the underpass of the station and out into the cemetery, you will have noticed a big change to the grassy area on the left before reaching the gate of the cemetery. For many years, this area has just been a piece of rough ground owned by South Western Railway, and was the original turntable site where the trains from London bringing the coffins into the cemetery would turn around the engine. The UK is celebrating 200 years of the railway, and one of the projects has been to create gardens and exhibitions using surplus land and areas into something that is useful, interesting and pleasant to see. We are lucky that Brookwood has been included, and a beautiful garden has been built, complete with raised flower beds, new turf, trees and seating. If you are early for your train, waiting for someone to arrive, or just want a place to sit and contemplate the nature around you, this is now a delightful place to be. All the work and materials have been donated by Hackwoods Building Company and Leslie J Thorpe Builders. This project has been the idea of Paula Aldridge of South Western Railway. 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BROOKWOOD HONEY



'It has been a wonderful year for producing honey as the weather has been dry and warm and bees thrive when the nectar is flowing in all the flowers'. Dawn Coe, a Brookwood resident, has been a beekeeper since 2019 and has produced 250 jars of honey this year from just three colonies of bees. She kindly talked to me about how much she enjoys beekeeping and how she decided to take up this hobby. Dawn's grandparents kept bees and her father loved growing flowers, so it is partly in memory of them all that she is continuing the family connection of beekeeping. Dawn first attended a six-week theory course at a teaching apiary, followed by a six-week practical course. She then bought her first hive and obtained a queen and a nucleus of bees, (which were a few thousand) and so began a fascinating hobby. The hives need to be in a sunny place ideally with the

entrance facing south, with access to water nearby such as a bird bath. Over winter Dawn feeds them a sugar solution and a sugar paste and insulates the hive so that the bees can survive the cold weather. Then, when the weather is warming up, the bees can be handled again. There is a distinct hierarchy amongst the colony, and they somehow organise themselves to do different jobs, such as cleaning the cells and looking after the queen who lays eggs, as well as guarding the entrance to the hive. The worker bees are smaller and female, while the drones are larger and male, with the workers collecting nectar and pollen, which is their sugar water and protein source. After chewing and mixing the nectar with enzymes, they regurgitate it from their honey stomach and store it in the cells. The water evaporates off, and honey is left which the bees cap off, and this is their food for winter months. The bees can fly a three-mile radius so long as they have the



energy to return to the hive. It is a commitment to own a colony and Dawn's three hives means that she devotes about two hours per week keeping the bees happy and healthy throughout the year. Pollinating flowers, producing honey, and being a vital part of the animal food chain, bees are great for the environment. When they are agitated, bees release a pheromone called isopentyl acetate which can be masked by smoke, ensuring that bees remain calm when beekeepers are working in their environment. Although one of their natural predators is the hornet which kills bees, British bees are now under threat from the Asian hornet (Yellow Legged Hornet),



which is much more aggressive, killing up to 50 bees a day. They are distinguished by a black abdomen and are smaller than the European hornet which is orange and yellow. If you see an Asian hornet, you are encouraged to report any sightings by quickly emailing altrnonnative@ceh.ac.uk, or download an app called Asian Hornet Watch.

CANAL TOWPATH CLOSURE & CALENDAR

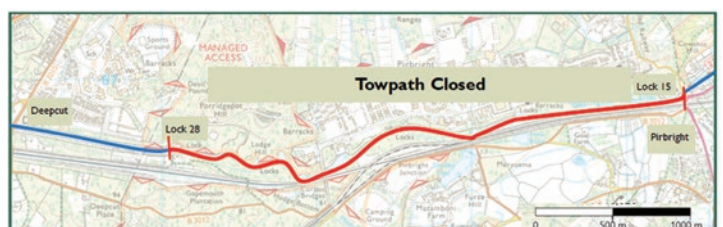
Please be aware that the towpath between Lock 15 at Pirbright and Lock 28 Deepcut will be closed from 29 September to 31 December. This is to facilitate a towpath improvement project between the two locks. During closure there will be no access from Curzon Bridge onto the upstream or downstream towpath, although access to the barracks via Gole Road will be unaffected.
